In the second half of 1 Thessalonians 4, Paul addresses a very practical and understandable concern. As Christians wait for the Lord's return, what about those who have passed away? These words about the resurrection and Second Coming of Christ give us hope and encouragement that at the end, believers will always be with the Lord.

What does vs. 13-14 reveal about grief and how the Lord wants us to experience it? What does it *NOT* reveal?

What does Christian grief look like?

Why is such emphasis placed upon the resurrection in this chapter? Consider Paul's words in 1 Corinthians 15:12-22.

Consider Revelation 21:1-5. What impact does knowing this outcome have on us today?

Why do you think Paul wanted to bring those in Thessalonica, and us today, to the conclusion given in vs. 18?

When you consider the end times, what feelings, emotions, questions arise?

APPLICATION

How does this passage encourage you? What is your primary take-away?
