In the first half of chapter 2, Paul gave a description of the coming day of the Lord. His words were to be received as an encouragement to those who feared that the Day had already come and they were missed. In the second half of the chapter, Paul finishes his thought with a strengthening of what is true and an encouragement to stand firm in what they've learned.

List the things Paul mentions that we've received form God in vs. 16.

What does Paul pray for on behalf of those receiving this letter in the final two verses?

INTERPRETATION

As vs. 13 opens, it begins with the connecting word, *but*. What has just come in the previous section that necessitates this connecting word?

What does Paul mean when he refers to the Thessalonians as the "firstfruits" in vs. 13? Consider where the term is used in other places of scripture (Leviticus 23:10, 1 Corinthians 16:15, Romans 8:23)

What does sanctification mean? How do we obtain it, according to vs. 13?

In vs. 14, what is Paul speaking of when he mentions "obtaining the glory of the Lord"?

What are the traditions Paul references in vs. 15? Consider Mark 7:6-9 for insight.

Explain what Paul means when he calls his readers to "stand firm" in the faith? Consider how he says to do this in vs. 15 and how he speaks to the same notion in Galatians 5:1 and Philippians 4:1.

What seems to be the focus of Paul's prayer in vs. 16-17? Why do you think he prays for this specifically? Consider Psalm 51:10, Proverbs 4:23, Matthew 5:8.

APPLICATION

What does it look like for you to stand firm in Christ, today?

As you consider the prayer Paul offers in vs. 16-17, who is someone you could pray the same for right now?
