In the first half of chapter 3, Paul reminded the Colossians of their new life in Christ, that general characteristics of living have shifted as we "put off" the old life and "put on" the new. As the chapter continues, Paul drills down to specific roles that are different in a Christian household, specifically, calling on all members to live a life of love and service to one another.

Colossians 3:18-4:1 Rules for Christian Households

What two people does Paul address in vs. 22-4:1? Describe the specific commands he gives to each of them. What is the warning given in vs. 25?

INTERPRETATION

Take a moment to read the "sister" passage to this section in Ephesians 5:22-6:4

What does it mean to submit? Who else is called to submit in scripture? See James 4:7; Ephesians 5:21, 24; Hebrews 13:17; 1 Peter 2:13; Luke 22:42)

Considering the verses above, why do you think submission in a Christian household is fitting to the Lord?

Love can mean many things in our language, what exactly is Paul calling upon husbands to do according to this kind of love? (see 1 John 3:16, 4:7-12)

Explain how obedience is pleasing to the Lord and why it ought to be a good motivation for children. Consider 2 John 4 and 3 John 4.

What is a bondservant and master? What do these roles look like today?

What might it look like to work "heartily" for the Lord in what you do?

How does the knowledge that we have a Master in heaven motivate us to treat those we lead justly and fairly? Consider Galatians 6:7.

Which one of these roles is God prodding you toward today? How are you enabled to fulfill this role (3:1-3), and what steps do you need to take this week in order to do so?
