Immediately after the fall that occurs in Genesis 3, we come upon the story of Cain and Abel. The rebellion of Adam and Eve spirals downward in this particular chapter as we see Cain taking the life of his brother, resulting in a further distance from the Holy presence of God.

Familiar stories like Cain and Abel can lose their punch as we tend to forget the weight of what's unfolding. What details are worth noting in Lamech's poem in vs. 23-24?

As the chapter ends, what began to happen at this particular time?

INTERPRETATION

Why was God not satisfied with Cain's offering, but was with Abel's?

What do we learn about sin and it's power from this passage? Consider too 1 Peter 5:8-9.

What does Cain's response to his actions in vs. 9 reveal about his attitude toward what's happened?

How is God's character revealed in the consequences given Cain?

What comparison can you make from the details given about Lamech in vs. 19 and God's original design of marriage in 3:24-25?

Why do you think Lamech's poem in vs. 23-24 draws a comparison to Cain's "revenge"?

What is the meaning of vs. 26? Consider Genesis 12:8, 13:4, 21:33, and 26:25 for insight.

APPLICATION

How does sin in Genesis 3-4 undo God's creative work from Genesis 1 and 2?

How do we know and understand God's redemptive presence when we sin as Christ-followers?
