In Ruth 3 we see an interesting effort to gain favor, quickly. Ruth, following Naomi's instruction, goes to the threshing floor at night to lay at Boaz's feet and ask to come under his wing of protection and provision. Boaz responds favorably, but points out that he is not the closest kinsman redeemer and promises to resolve the matter with this other relative the next day. Before sending Ruth back to Naomi, he shows generosity to her, demonstrating solid character.

How does Boaz end his meeting with Ruth as the chapter closes?

INTERPRETATION

How has Naomi's attitude changed since chapter one when she despaired of Ruth ever getting married again? How would you account for this change?

What do you think of Naomi's advice to Ruth in "advancing" toward Boaz? Would you call this good or bad advice and why?

What do you perceive to be Naomi's desired outcome of Ruth and Boaz's interaction? Why is she working so hard to accomplish this? (Consider Ruth 1:9-12 for perspective)

What does Ruth mean when she asks Boaz to "spread his wings over her"?

Boaz says that he is a kinsman redeemer in verse 12. What is a kinsman redeemer and what responsibilities do they have? (Consider Leviticus 25:25; 35: 47-49; Numbers 35:19; Deuteronomy 25:5-10)

What do you conclude about Boaz's character from this passage? How do you draw your conclusion?

APPLICATION

What is the thing (or things) that you are most prone to take into your own hands, rather than trust God? What might be some first steps in handing those things over to the Lord?
